

People, Pets & Vets in November!

Brighten up those collars, harnesses and leashes

What happened to your greyhound's bright blue collar? And why does the yellow leash look faded and spotted? Time to clean those leashes and collars! Just place the items in a bucket of super hot water with a squirt of laundry detergent. Stir those leashes with a paint stick. You'll be surprised at how quickly the bucket fills with dingy water. Dump out the dirty water and repeat with clean hot water and detergent. I like to let the collars and leashes soak for 30 minutes. Rinse thoroughly in cool water. Hang outdoors to dry. You'll be surprised at the results -- all for 5 minutes of work..... Nancy Kornfield

A little hint for training your grey and maybe saving a life. Try teaching your dog to stay when you open the door. Then tell them ok to proceed. This will prevent them from bolting as soon as the door is opened.. It works great for car doors too!

Belly Bands – They're not just for the belly!

Do you have a sweet little boy greyhound that seems to misbehave when he visits your nearest and dearest friend's house? Does he seem to take aim at plants, sofas or the corner of the fireplace? I have a sweet boy who does that.

I love having friends visit me with their greyhounds but surely don't want their greyhounds to personalize my home. The answer –belly bands. A belly band is a wide band of soft material that wraps around the male greyhound's waist and penis. It



fastens with Velcro. It comes in various sizes and wraps comfortably around your dog's belly. It should not be tight. You may find that just the presence of the belly wrap around your dog will deter him from raising his leg and marking. Or if he does attempt to mark, at least the urine will be captured by the belly band.



Belly bands can also be helpful as your senior dog ages and may not be able to hold his urine as long. A feminine hygiene pad can be inserted inside the belly band for additional absorption and simplify clean-up.

They're machine washable . I have several belly bands so that I

can be prepared when friends come to visit or when I go visiting. The little rascals are now gentlemen...... Nancy Kornfield



MICHIGAN GREYHOUND CONNECTION PEEPAWS RECOVERY....

Earlier this year, just as winter was beginning to relax its grip over the southern Great Lakes and springtime optimism was slowly creeping into the air, my boy Shata (aka Peepaws, then 11 years old) broke his left rear leg in a panicked fall on a tile floor. As is greyhound custom, he was merely trying to jump onto the couch. However, he chose to leap from an area of recently-exposed tile floor instead of from the rug that covers much of the room. He lost his balance, fell, and frantically tried to get back up, kicking and clawing in desperation. I came to his assistance and tried to right him, but to my disbelief he could not stand as usual--one of his legs was twisting unnaturally. My morning preparations dramatically interrupted, I quickly hoisted him out to my car and over to the local animal hospital (namely, the Ann Arbor Animal Hospital). Before long, Shata was sedated and we had begun the hour-and-a-half journey



to the clinic at Michigan State University. Much to my dismay, the sedatives wore off about halfway to East Lansing, and Shata was intent on standing (and yelping). His leg was braced, of course, but it was unnerving.

We made it, and the students at MSU helped cart the poor pup into their facility. It was a relief to know

Shata was in competent hands. But questions of the dreaded "C" word were in the air. Despite the confidence of the doctor at the Ann Arbor Hospital that the x-rays did not show cancer, the vets at MSU would further investigate when they performed Shata's surgery. I was deep in uncertainty until that time, which would not be until the following morning (Thursday). Shata would then spend at least one more night in East Lansing to be monitored--I could pick him up Friday at the earliest. For two nights I was without my buddy, fearing the worst. My fears were lessened on Thursday after I finally heard from MSU about the surgery's outcome. The doctors there, like at Ann Arbor, did not see evidence of cancer, and the surgery went well otherwise.

Still, I knew it would be a long recovery. I sprang Shata from Michigan State on Friday afternoon--he was reportedly very unhappy with his accommodations there. The ride home was uneventful and, despite my worries, so was his exit from the car. He was swollen and bruised and rough around the edges, but he did his best to get back in the home groove. After I finally got him into his bed, I lay next to him and pet him until he let out a big sigh. I couldn't help thinking he was relieved to be home.

Lying down for Shata was often a challenge, as his braced and stiff leg would not allow him to squat and lower himself in his accustomed way. But he muddled through. He also valiantly (read: reluctantly) took all his painkillers and medications. We had embarked, as they say, on the road to recovery.

I'm happy to report that: so far, so good. We celebrated



Shata's 12th birthday in June. Today his fur (shaved for the surgery) has grown back enough that he looks good as new. It's been hot this summer, but Shata now goes on long walks when time and weather permit. He even accompanied the family on vacation to Petoskey in August (which was not much different from his normal life, truth be told!).

I could not end this note without immensely thanking the Michigan Greyhound Connection, for its support both emotional and financial! It would have been much harder to get through this without them. Thanks also go to my family, who helped out generously with the brindle boy. And thanks of course to all the doctors and students in Ann Arbor and East Lansing who cared for Shata. Shata thanks everyone as well, for helping to ensure that he can leap up on four good legs every time he hears someone snacking in the kitchen. Ian Bost
